GOOD FRIDAY (TENEBRAE)

April 18, 2025

Please gather in silence.

The Service of Tenebrae (meaning "darkness" or "shadow") has been in use in the Christian Church for some thirteen hundred years. During this service of readings and hymns, candles and lights are extinguished successively to signify the darkness of death that came upon our Lord on that Friday we call "good." The seven words our Lord spoke from his cross make up this evening's readings. The service concludes with a whispered Lord's Prayer.

Please stand as the minister enters in silence.

The Lord preserves the faithful but abundantly repays the one who | acts in pride.







LITANY FOR GOOD FRIDAY

- P Lord have mercy

- C Christ, graciously hear us

- P God the Son, Redeemer of the world
- C Have mercy on us
- P God the Holy Spirit
- C Have mercy on us
- P By Thy suffering in death, by the hurt of Judas' treachery, by the pain of Peter's denial, by Thy agony and bloody sweat, by the robe of purple and the crown of thorns, by the sting of the whip and the lash of the scourge, by the way of the cross, by the nails and thirst, by Thy blood that stained the holy cross, by the travail of Thy soul, by Thine expiring cry, by Thy triumph in death,
- C Hear us, O Dying Redeemer.

The Christ Candle is removed signifying the death of our Lord.

- P From hardness of heart and darkness of soul, from coldness of mind, from trampling Thy blood on the way of sin, from driving the nails again, from crucifying Thee anew, from forgetfulness of Thy great sorrow, from the loneliness of life without Thee, from greed and ambition, from lust of eye and pride of life, from the burden of remembered sin, from the cunning of men, from the confusion of ignorance, from hate, from a jealous heart, from the last sin of unbelief.
- C Deliver us, O Living Redeemer.

Silence

All (Whispered in unison) Our Father, who art in heaven hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

THE STREPITUS (The slamming of the Bible signifies the scourging of the soldiers, the earthquake at our Lord's death, and the crashing of the rock over our His tomb. By God's great mercy, our sins are forever locked within! God sees them no more!! The lighted candles return on Easter. The dread darkness of death cannot extinguish He who is the Light of Life. Neither shall it extinguish you.)

The minister exits the chancel.

The congregation may be seated and is invited to remain for meditation as long as they wish before dispersing quietly.

The service continues Easter morning at 6:31am (outdoors) and 10:15am.
